This year's Town Report is dedicated to Jill A. Lindenmeyr, a woman who has committed her generosity and strength to her family and community for the last 38 years. Jill has served in several capacities for the Town of Elmore. She started as a volunteer Art teacher at the Elmore School in the late 1970s, continued as a member of several other boards including the Select Board, the Planning Board, the Conservation Board and the Elmore Historical Society. Jill currently continues to serve as a Justice of the Peace and member of the Development Review Board, positions she has held for the past 25 plus years! Jill can always be seen handing out ballets at all of our Town, State and General Elections. She always enjoys having the Elmore School children come in and explain to them all about the process and their right to vote. Jill has taken great pride in being involved in the Elmore community on many different levels and will continue to do so for many years to come.

Jill was born in Pennsylvania in October of 1942, one of six children. She was educated at George School, University of Hawaii, and Beaver College. A few years after schooling, Jill met Henry Lindenmeyr IV, married him and bought a home in Buckingham, PA, where they started a family. They eventually purchased land in East Elmore with the intent of creating a homestead. In 1976, Jill decided it was time to head north solo with her two sons to undertake creating a new home. With the help of neighbors and friends she constructed a unique timber-framed house and farm where she raised sheep, pigs, rabbits, chickens, and a family cow. The farm became a home for her boys and many others that passed through its doors over the last four decades.

Jill has always had a huge passion for the arts and is adept in many different mediums. She can draw, paint, silk screen, work with wood and clay, and still does some framing in her studio. She is also very willing to share her talents with the community. I am sure most members of Elmore have worn a shirt that she has designed and screened for one community affair or another. One example would be the Zucchini Fest ("Zuke Fest"), a much-loved community event that she co-founded and held in the ball field on her property from 1980-2000. She also helped organize the Town Hall Halloween event for several years, giving the little ones of Elmore a place to enjoy a rural Halloween.

Jill currently represents Elmore on the Lamoille County Planning Commission Board and has volunteered for many years with the local branch of the United Way. She has also been a member of the Stowe Ski School for the last 30 years, dedicating her time to teaching people how to love the sport of skiing and the outdoors in general. For her 70th birthday she joined 4 other women her age to trek in the Himalayas for five weeks, demonstrating her love for the outdoors, the excitement of adventure, and the pure joy she receives hearing other people's stories.

It is certain that there are events and services not mentioned above, but the following words describe Jill and why she is worthy of the Town of Elmore's dedication - Mother, Farmer, Teacher, Conservationist, Naturalist, Skier, Adventurer, Artisan, and Organizer. Her passion, generosity, creativity and tenacious strength have helped shape the Town of Elmore as well as the next generation of its occupants for the better, and we are grateful.

Art.8 Will the Town School District vote a budget of \$2,187,300 to meet expenses and liabilities of the Town School District for the Fiscal Year 2014-2015?

Art. 9 Will the Town School District authorize the School Directors to borrow money to pay current expenses and debts of the Town School District, in anticipation of the collection of taxes and returns from the State for such purposes, and to issue notes to the School District?

Art. 10 Will the Town School District, in Town School District Meeting, authorize the Elmore School Board to establish a reserve fund for the purpose of defraying future educational expenses utilizing all carry forward exceeding the amount of \$184,000 budgeted in the revenue projection for carry forward in the 2014-2015 school year budget?

Art. 11 Will the Town vote to authorize the Select Board to spend a sum of not more than \$90,000 for the purchase of a 10 ton, 4WD, dump body Utility Truck for the Town Highway Dept.?

Art.14 Will the Town vote to apply any surplus from the current fiscal year to reduce taxes in the next fiscal year 2014-2015?

Art. 15 Will the Town vote to call the Annual Meeting of the Town of Elmore on the first Tuesday of March, 2015 at 9:00 A.M.?

Elmore School District School Report and Report of the Board of School Directors 2014

This annual report provides the School Directors with the opportunity to inform the community of Elmore about the activities occurring at the Elmore School as well as to share information about available programs.

Mrs. Annamary Anderson, who has a bachelor's degree in early childhood education, a master's degree in education and meets the Vermont State requirements as a Highly Qualified Teacher, is in her fourteenth year as the teacher for the students at the Elmore School. Mrs. Ericka Bellavance is the teacher assistant at the Elmore School. Mrs. Anderson and Mrs. Bellavance are enjoying their ninth year as the instructional team. Miss Charity Lanphear a special education aide, is in her second year supporting Elmore students. Elmore School also accesses the services of a Behavior Interventionist in partnership with Lamoille County Mental Health.

Currently we have 20 students enrolled in grades 1 through 3. Next school year, we anticipate that 20 students in grades 1 through 3 will attend Elmore.

The Elmore School was recognized by the Vermont Agency of Education for high levels of student achievement reflected within the school accountability formula. The Secretary of Education wrote, "The Elmore School is congratulated for having met AYP targets for all student groups for which it is accountable." In a second letter of recognition, the Secretary of Education indicated that:

"The Elmore School is commended for its commitment to continuous improvement. That commitment has been demonstrated by the fact that the percentage of all students in the proficient or above category for NECAP scores in both reading and mathematics is 20% or more above the state average. This is a significant and important accomplishment that reflects a concerted and intentional effort to improve educational opportunities and learning outcomes for the students of Elmore School."

In addition to high academic expectations, citizenship is an important part of the curriculum at the Elmore School. This fall, students studied the Preamble to the Constitution and compared their classroom rules to four main ideas including Justice, Domestic Tranquility, General Welfare and Liberty. Students also seek to serve their community through familiar and new service initiatives. For example, this year students contributed to the Lamoille Food Share's "Let's Bag Hunger!" campaign by making reusable grocery bags out of T-shirts and collecting and donating food.

On behalf of the children and teachers of the school, we would like to thank the Elmore community for all its support, from the use of the Town Hall for activities such as physical education, music, and special events from our Winter Festival, to the annual visit to the Elmore Fire Station, and the many individual contributions of time and talent in support of our children.

Each year we take this opportunity to be sure you are aware of the services accessible to the children and families of Elmore. There are a variety of early care and educational opportunities available. The Elmore School District supports high quality pre-school learning opportunities for resident three and four year olds in school-based and community care settings. The Early Education program provides screening and educational support for qualifying three to five year olds in need of pre-school services. Interested parents may contact the LSSU early childhood program at 888-6707 or visit the website at http://www.lamoillesouthsu.org/EarlyEducation.htm for more information. Playgroups and information regarding supports for young children are also offered through the Lamoille Family Center at 888-5229.

There are a number of other community agencies and organizations that provide support to children and families in the Lamoille Valley area. The Agency of Human Services' regional office is located in Morrisville and offers outreach services to families in Elmore through the Departments of Children and Families, Social Welfare, Health, and Vocational Rehabilitation. Additionally, Lamoille County Mental Health Services, Sterling Area Services, and the Lamoille Family Center provide services and programs.

Technical educational opportunities are provided to high school students and adults at the Green Mountain Technology and Career Center. There are many continuing education opportunities at the Center for adults wishing to improve skills for their current career or who are interested in changing careers. Information about these opportunities can be obtained by calling 888-4447 or visiting their website at: http://www.gmtcc.info/.

The on-going collaborative efforts of parents and staff and continued support from the community are key components of the success of Elmore students. The members of the Elmore School District Board of Directors would like to thank the community for their strong support of our children and school.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and the aggregate remaining fund information of Elmore School District, Vermont, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2013, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the School District's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Elmore School District, Vermont's basic financial statements. The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements.

The combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain

additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the combining and individual nonmajor fund financial statements are fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated December 11, 2013, on our consideration of the Elmore School District, Vermont's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. We have expanded our membership somewhat, necessitating the purchase of new gear for those new members. We always welcome new members in order to adequately respond to community emergencies. ROAD COMMISSIONER REPORT

The year of 2013 shall not soon be forgotten for its many challenges and success. The Highway Department dealt with extreme weather conditions, and climate changes posed delays and difficulties in doing regular maintenance.

Improvements were made during the construction season on Earl Gray Road and Beach Road. This work is not considered a total road rebuild. Earl Gray Road required tree and brush removal, ditching and resurfacing. Beach Road work was done on the unpaved section with tree and brush removal and much needed ditching. A total of 13 culverts were changed out with larger and longer culverts. Some resurface work was done also. This will improve drainage and meet new state standards.

Lacasse Road culvert project was delayed to summer of 2014 so we could help with the construction of the new water system project. This enlistment of services was a factor in getting project completed on time and meeting budget requirement.

Lamoille County Planning Commission updated our bridge, culvert, and transportation projects maps. This helps the highway department have a visual of what, where and when and to prioritize projects for budgeting and construction.

In November a low cost storage building was erected next to the existing Town Garage to house the grader and other equipment. This will greatly help the longevity and value of our equipment.

All this work would not have been completed without the dedication of full and part time employees of the Elmore Highway Department, support and direction of the Select Board and the use of contractors like Tallman Excavation, Northco Land Management, and Greg Lussier Builders.

We encourage members of the community to review the updated information on a regular basis. Public attendance is welcome at the Planning Commission meetings. The EPC meets, as a general rule, on the fourth Wednesday of each month, at the Town Clerk's office. Meetings begin at 6:00 p.m.

The Lake Association is pleased to report a continuing decline in the growth of Eurasian Watermilfoil in Lake Elmore based on information provided by the dive team we have employed for the past ten years to help control milfoil in the lake.

As was reported last year, the suction harvester is used very little now. Since there are no dense beds of milfoil to be removed, it is much easier for the divers to work without the harvester, This saves wear and tear on the machinery resulting in low-cost maintenance. For the past few seasons, we have employed just two divers which also has reduced expenses considerably.

Although our grant money from the State of Vermont has diminished over the past few years, adequate funding is currently available to finance our operation. This being the case, we will not be asking the Town of Elmore for funding in 2014. Since we are never sure just how much we will be awarded in grant money, we may find it necessary at some future date to request an allocation from the town to help with the project. At this time, our financial needs are being met.

The Elmore Lake Association wishes to thank the voters of the Town of Elmore for supporting the milfoil project. We hope that 2014 will be as productive and successful as in past years as we work to keep Lake Elmore healthy for all to enjoy.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER REPORT

2013 has been a typical year for Animal Control. The biggest problem continues to be the failure to license and dogs in violation of the town ordinance mandating that no domestic dog or wolf hybrid shall run at large in the Town. What does "at large" mean? "At large" means that the pet is not:

- 1. On a leash; or
- 2. In a vehicle; or
- 3. On the owner's property; or
- 4. On the property of another person with that person's permission; or
- 5. Clearly under the verbal or nonverbal control of the owner; or
- 6. Hunting with the owner.

Please help us make our town a better place for our pets and our neighbors by being a responsible pet owner. License your dog/s so that if they do get loose we know who to return them to. This will help you to avoid an expensive visit to the shelter to retrieve your pet.

Licensing of dogs in Vermont is not a means of fundraising as some may believe. The main purpose of the Vermont dog license law is to insure that dogs are vaccinated for rabies and this law has gone a long ways toward eradicating rabies in Vermont.

We do have Vermont Municipal Violation Complaint forms now so tickets can be issued for all violations listed in the town ordinance.

Most violations (including failure to license) result in a \$100.00 fine from the state or a court visit to contest this fine.

PERMITS/LICENSES REQUIRED

HIGHWAY ACCESS: A permit is required from the Road Commissioner for any access from property to all Town Roads (V.S.A. 19-1-43 Art. 460)

BUILDING AND SEPTIC PERMITS: A permit is required from the Zoning Administrator before any building or structure is erected, enlarged, relocated or changed in use in any district, and also for any land development and subdivision (except agriculture or forestry). A permit is required from the State Environmental Dept. before any sewage disposal system is built, altered or repaired. Applications and fee schedule may be picked up at the Town Clerk's Office or at our Web Site www.elmorevt.org

DOG LICENSES: Pursuant to 20 V.S.A Art. 3581, a person who owns, harbors, or keeps a dog more than four months shall annually, on or before April 1, cause it to be registered.

MOBILE HOMES:

As required in 32 V.S.A. Sec. 5079, an owner of a mobile home shall register the home with the clerk in the municipality in which it is located by providing a bill of sale or true copy thereof. The clerk shall maintain a public record of mobile home registrations and shall charge a fee of \$10.00 for each registration.

PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS:

The final installment of FY 2013-14 Property Tax is due and payable on March 18, 2014. If payment is not in the Town Clerk's Office by said due date they will be turned over to the Delinquent Tax Collector for collection and an 8 percent collection fee and interest of 1 percent per month will be levied on all delinquent accounts.

APPROPRIATIONS 2014-15

AMERICAN RED CROSS

The American Red Cross of Vermont & the New Hampshire Valley is on call to help our community 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and 365 days a year. A local Red Cross Volunteer is often the first "neighbor on the scene" after a disaster strikes offering a hot cup of coffee, a warm blanket and a glimmer of hope to those in need. Supported primarily by volunteers, the Red Cross provides emergency support for victims of fire, flood and other disasters as well as instruction in health, safety and aquatics courses. Whether we are helping one family recover from a devastating home fire, providing emergency shelter and supplies to hundreds of families after a major disaster, or food and water for first responders, we have historically been a vital part of the local community. Over the past two years, we have been focusing on disaster preparedness, specifically, working to help communities become better prepared when a disaster strikes. This program is called the Local Disaster Shelter Initiative and its purpose is to offer each town in our region the training, support, and supplies to open its own emergency shelter during times of disaster when outside assistance is not available.

The Red Cross of Vermont & New Hampshire requests from the Town of Elmore the amount of \$250 to help ensure that we will have the resources to support communities like Elmore and throughout Vermont and the Upper Valley when they need it most.

CENTRAL VERMONT ADULT BASIC EDUCATION IN ELMORE

Elmore adults and youth who are out of school seeking help with learning basic reading, writing, math and English as another language may receive that help through a free program of instruction provided by Central Vermont Adult Basic Education. Students enrolled in the program also have the opportunity to study for their high school equivalency exam (GED) or to pursue other options for gaining a diploma.

Students and teachers meet in classes, one-to-one, and/or small group sessions to complete a learning program which suits the requirements of each adult student. Individualized instruction ties together basic literacy and math skills with practical interest areas. Helping children with homework, budgeting, filling out forms and applications, learning beginning computer skills, studying for a driver's permit or a Commercial Driving License, reading work related texts, writing reports, and preparing for employment or college are just a few of the many areas which adults choose to study.

Over the past ten years an average of 3-4 Elmore residents have enrolled in CVABE annually.

CENTRAL VERMONT COUNCIL ON AGING

Central Vermont Council on Aging is a nonprofit organization. There is no charge to elders and their families for services provided. The Council uses federal, state, and local funds to provide a variety of programs and services, either directly or under contract with local groups and organizations.

Among the services provided directly by or under contract with CVCOA are information and assistance; community and home delivered meals; health insurance counseling; transportation to essential destinations; family caregiver support and respite grants; mental health services; legal services; companionship; food stamp and fuel assistance outreach; and help with household tasks. Older residents of the Town of Elmore often require the services of a case manager to assist their special needs, develop an individualized care plan, and to connect them with public benefits programs and other community and state resources. The CVCOA Case manager for Elmore is Christine Melicharek, who can be reached at 802-888-1393.

CENTRAL VERMONT COMMUNITY ACTION

Since 1965, the Central Vermont Community Action Council, Inc. has served low-income residents of Lamoille, Orange, and Washington counties and some communities in Windsor, Addison, and Rutland Counties. CVCAC's programs and services assist families working toward creating better lives and to improve the overall quality of community life. This year CVCAC served 17,753 people in 9,264 Vermont households through Head Start/Early Head Start, Community Economic Development programs, Family & Community Support Services, including emergency food and Crisis Fuel, and home Weatherization assistance.

Program and services accessed by 18 Elmore families with 45 residents this past year include: 13 individuals in 6 households accessed nutritious meals and/or meal equivalents at the food shelf. 5 households with 11 family members were able to keep heating their homes with help from our Crises & Supplemental fuel programs.; 7 individuals in 3 households worked with housing counselors to find and retain affordable safe, secure housing. 13 children were in Head Start & Early Head Start programs that supported 3 additional family members. 1 individual attended classes or met one-on-one with a financial counselor to be better able to manage and grow family finances. 1 entrepreneur received counseling and technical assistance on starting or growing a business.

CLARINA HOWARD NICHOLS CENTER

Clarina Howard Nichols Center was founded in 1981 as Lamoille County's response to sexual and domestic violence. Clarina provides advocacy, shelter, and support to individuals and families affected by domestic or sexual violence as well as outreach education programs.

Clarina's core services include:

- Emergency shelter for individuals and families fleeing domestic and sexual violence.
- 24 hour crisis hotline
- Advocacy in legal, benefits administration, healthcare, education & housing areas.
- Child Advocacy support for children and families.
- Support groups for women & children
- Outreach education program and school based support groups
- Criminal and Family Court Advocacy

HABITAT FOR HUMANITY LAMOILLE COUNTY AFFILIATE

Lamoille County Chapter of Habitat for Humanity began in 2008 and is a local non-profit organization pursuing building of decent affordable homes for people who do not qualify for a standard loan.

A site in Morrisville has been cleared and a home is nearly completed. The building of a Habitat home relies on volunteers, people who donate hundreds of hours to help a family have a home of their own. The family must also put in "sweat equity" hours, which they have done while working their regular jobs. Businesses have also been incredibly generous with donated materials and labor. These are exciting times. The plan calls for the family to move into their home on the Mayo Road this spring. In order to continue building, however, we need financial support. We will not stop at this one house, but will continue to build a home for another family who meets criteria.

LAMOILLE COUNTY COURT DIVERSION RESTORATIVE JUSTICE PROGRAMS, INC.

LCCDRJP is a local, non-profit organization whose primary focus is keeping young people out of the criminal justice system. Over the years, thousands of individuals throughout the Lamoille Valley have received support from this organization; 877 last year alone. Volunteers are a vital part of that community connection – 52 volunteers contributed more than 2,000 hours on community boards and mentoring children in 2013. Over the past year, 5 individuals from Elmore were helped by LCCDRJP.

From truancy intervention to employment support to restorative justice programming, LCCDRJP's primary focus is to keep people out of the criminal justice system by empowering them to make good choices and connect positively to their community.

LAMOILLE COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH

Lamoille Community Connections has always strived to provide the highest quality services and support to our community to enhance independence and quality of life. This past year we have focused our energy on strengthening our services for people with developmental disabilities, adults with severe and persistent mental illness and supporting children, youth and their family's. We have been collaborating with our community partners to improve the delivery of services and new programs such as; Psychiatric Nurse Practitioner, Youth in Transition, children's Integrated Services and Creative Workforce Solution. These two areas will continue to be high on our list of priorities for the coming year. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2013 we served 13 Elmore individuals.

We have maintained a 24 hour 365 day a year Emergency/Crisis response team that works with local police, EMT, Copley Hospital ER and other providers. This is the only full time emergency/crisis response service in the region. Your continued contribution and support is always valued but is more important than ever as state revenues have gone down and funding of services has been reduced. In these times, the people at the local level must do what we can to support our families and friends who find themselves in need. Our commitment to you is that when there is need we will be there.

LAMOILLE COUNTY CONSERVATION DISTRICT

The LCCD is a not-for-profit organization that exists as a local branch of government by the Soil and Water Conservation Act. We are categorized by the Internal Revenue Service as a 501 c4, typically falling under county government. Since 1945 we've worked to educate, conserve, and protect the natural resources of Lamoille County with farmers, landowners, and municipalities. Our mission is to be a local voice for conservation, preservation, and stewardship of all natural resources and work in conjunction with other agencies (private and public) at the grassroots level. Some of our 2013 highlights include:

- Installed riparian buffers throughout the and Lamoille River Watershed
- Coordinated a Portable Skidder Bridge rental program for loggers
- Coordination of a Hyrdoseeder Program for municipalities
- Led service learning programs to 425 elementary, middle, and high school students
- Facilitated 2,000 hours of volunteer service benefiting Lamoille County
- Delivered over 100 conservation education programs to 3,215 students, teachers, and citizens

Last year our expenditures totaled approximately \$130,423 of which only \$8,000 came from the state with no strings attached. The difference is made up in grants, partners, foundations and our local communities.

LAMOILLE COUNTY PLANNING COMMISSION

The LCPC provides municipal assistance in the following areas:

Municipal plan and bylaw updates and community development technical assistance, geographic information services, including mapping, transportation and natural resource planning and related project development services, grant application writing and grant administration, emergency response planning, access to local planning documents and regulations.

This year the Commission supported the efforts of Elmore by initiating a Lake Elmore shoreline build-out analysis, updating the local Hazard Mitigation Plan, continued updates to the Town Plan, completed traffic counts and developed road name maps for the Fire Dept. and researched road standards and ordinance examples for Town's update, completed a road erosion assessment, updated the Town's bridge and culvert inventory, and assisted with documenting projects to reduce transportation infrastructure conflicts with streams.

LAMOILLE COUNTY SPECIAL INVESTGATION UNIT

The Lamoille County special Investigation Unit was created in 2007 following the enactment of Legislation ensuring that all citizens of the State of VT have access to Special Investigation Units. The LCSIU represents a continued collaborative partnership between the Lamoille County State's Attorney Office, VT State Police, Lamoille County Sheriff's Dept., Stowe Police Dept., The Clarina Howard Nichols Center, and the Dept. for Children and Families, as well as various medical and therapeutic organizations.

A full time investigator is assigned to the Unit from the Lamoille County Sheriff's Dept. and a VT State Police Detective is assigned to the Unit as well. The Unit has co-located staff including a part time prosecutor, a part time victim advocate, a part time executive director, and a part time administrative assistant. The Units primary responsibilities include investigating, prosecuting and providing victim services for victims of sex crimes, child abuse, domestic violence, and crimes against those with physical or developmental disabilities.

Due to a shortfall in meeting its annual operating expenses, the Unit is seeking contributions from each town within Lamoille County based on a percentage of population as a means of sustaining the continued operation of the Unit.

LAMOILLE COMMUNITY FOOD SHARE, INC.

Lamoille Community Food Share is a locally funded, volunteer powered non-profit corporation. Our mission is to help support and improve the physical well-being of individuals in our service area who might otherwise go hungry for reasons beyond their control. To this end, we will provide them with food free of charge, primarily on an emergency basis. We will encourage and guide them in the selection and preparation of healthful food. Our service area consists of the Lamoille County Vermont towns of Eden, Elmore, Hyde Park, Morristown, Stowe and Wolcott.

Through November of 2013 we have seen the same number of families from Elmore visit our pantry when compared to last year. We have served 23 families from Elmore including 35 adults and 16 children so far this year. 9 of the families had at least one family member who was working but they still could not make ends met. We appreciate the help we have received in the past and look forward to continued support from our friends and neighbors in Elmore.

LAMOILLE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT CORP.

Our corporation works with your Town to determine how we can be of service. We then deliver relevant services to your municipality or directly to your business community by partnering with Local, State & Federal agencies responsible for supporting economic growth. We participate as requested in town initiatives. This year we sponsored a series of small business workshops and from February through November offered 8 different workshops many of which were attended by residents of Elmore or business persons located in the town. In all, more than 200 Lamoille County residents attended these workshops. We thank the Town of Elmore and governing bodies for their professional help and we will work diligently to earn your continued support.

LAMOILLE FAMILY CENTER

The Lamoille Family Center is in its 38 year of service to children, youth and families by the Lamoille Family Center! During this time, thousands of individuals throughout the Lamoille Valley have received our services, including home visiting, parent education, playgroups, child-care resource and referral, youth services, and emergency assistance. Countless children are stronger, safer and more confident as a result of their involvement with the Family Center. In fiscal year 201d, more than 1,600 children, youth, parents and caregivers throughout the Lamoille Valley received home visits, participated in playgroups, attended parent education classes, received Reach Up services and engaged in monitored parent-child contact. Hundreds more families and child care providers received child care support services including assistance with applying for Child Care Financial Assistance, referral to regulated programs, professional development or child care staff, and participation in the Child and Adult Care Food Program.

Support through volunteer time, donation of goods and services and financial contribution remain vital to the sustainability of the Lamoille Family Center. We could not do this work without you. We invite you to stop by for a visit, meet some of our staff, and see a glimpse of what happens each day at the Family Center.

LAMOILLE HOME HEALTH & HOSPICE

This report is in the form of a friendly letter because "friend" is the perfect word to describe how we feel about your town. Through the years, support from Elmore has come in the form of town funds, service club contributions, individual gifts and memorials, hospice volunteers, board and committee members, and dedicated staff. Thank you, friends, for your generosity.

Our part in this friendship is the services we provide. This past year, in Elmore alone, home health nurses have made 234 visits, driving 2,051 miles. These visits included nursing, physical therapy, occupational therapy, medical social worker, licensed nursing assistants, personal care attendants and case managers. Your Town's appropriations, together with other funding sources of all kinds have help pay for these services. This mix of resources enables us to provide a variety of services which in turn helps meet your needs as a community. We appreciate our long-term friendship and hope that you will call us if we can be of help to you, your family, or your neighbors.

LAMOILLE HOUSING PARTNERSHIP, INC.

Lamoille Housing Partnership is a nonprofit, community-based affordable housing development organization, one of only 12 in the State of Vermont that perform similar functions in their respective communities. Our mission is to provide safe, decent, affordable rental & owner-occupied housing for residents of the Lamoille Valley area.

Over the past year, LHP has completed the redevelopment of the former Vermont Electric Co-op site into 28 affordable rental units for families and seniors living in Johnson. Also, in Morrisville & Stowe, LHP completed the renovation of 16 units of existing housing it owns, making these buildings more energy efficient and sustainable over the longer term. LHP remains committed to its vision to live in a community where all individuals recognize & support the necessity of affordable community housing and ensure that no one will be without a decent place to live, regardless of income.

MEALS ON WHEELS

Meals on Wheels of Lamoille County, provides home delivered meals to seniors and individuals with disabilities throughout Lamoille County. Our meals provide recipients with 1/3 of their daily nutritional requirements. In addition to a meal, our program provides a daily check-in by volunteers and staff who deliver the meals. Often times the meal delivery person is the only individual that our recipients will see in a day. This has led to volunteers and staff assisting in emergency situations. We are also able to make referrals to other needed services. Our services help our recipients to remain in their own homes and communities for as long as possible. Meals on Wheels has 2 meal sites throughout the county that provide a welcoming social environment for seniors to enjoy a nutritious meal together. In fiscal year 2013, ending on September 30, 2013 we served 9 residents of Elmore a total of 412 meals.

MORRISTOWN CENTENNIAL LIBRARY

For several years now, the Town of Elmore has graciously voted to support our building and renovation effort at the library that Elmore residents choose to use in relatively large numbers. The Morristown Centennial Library thanks the Town of Elmore for its past financial support and requests that it continue for the fiscal year 2013-2014. The completion of the enlarged building has increased demand for library services, and we have expanded our collection, computers, and programming. Your support would help us with these expenses.

NORTH COUNTRY ANIMAL LEAGUE

At this time North Country Animal League (NCAL) respectfully submits a request for \$300 in town allocation appropriation funds for the year 2014. These funds help us fulfill our mission of promoting compassionate and responsible relationships between animals and humans through education and adoption, spay/neuter programs, support of cruelty prevention and the sheltering of homeless animals. Our adoption fees of \$150 per dog and \$90 per cat pay only a small amount of the expenses incurred; spy/neuter, deworming, vaccines, food and care. To ensure the adoption of homeless animals, we must keep our adoption fees affordable. Since our adoption fees cover only the minimum of expense, we need community support for our humanitarian work. Thank you for your consideration of our request for annual support from Elmore without which many animals would suffer from cruelty or be euthanized needlessly.

LAMOILLE DAY HEALTH SERVICES (aka Out and About)

Lamoille Day Health Services is proud to serve the community by fulfilling our mission of providing adults with an alternative choice for long-term healthcare while remaining as independent as possible in the care setting of their choice. We are honored the community is continuing to choose Out and About to fulfill their needs in this way.

The number of participants we continue to serve has remained steady at 20 people per day. We believe we are able to sustain these daily numbers due to our excellent service, committed staff and positive atmosphere and support provided to the communities we serve.

As with each year, Elmore appropriations are crucial in our ability to provide their services our community members require. Some of the services we provide that Appropriation funding makes possible are assistance with personal care, transportation, nursing services, fun activities, nutritious meals, and caregiver respite.

RETIRED SENIOR VOLUNTEER PROGRAM

RSVP and The Volunteer Center for Central Vermont & Northeast Kingdom would like to request the same amount of appropriation from Elmore as last year. For the second year in a row our Federal funds have been cut by 20%. At the same time, many of the towns in our service area are still recovering from Irene and are looking at increased town expenses.

Volunteers are essential to the delivery of services in the area we serve. Vermont citizens, of all ages, are crucial to helping meet community needs. Without RSVP volunteers, many organization would find it difficult to maintain the services needed by our friends and neighbors. Where would the hospitals, schools, food pantries and many other organizations be without the services of volunteers? In the past 12 months, RSVP involved 832 volunteers at 87 sites in our service area. Those volunteers contributed over 84,580 hours of service. We calculate that those members provided 1.7 million dollars' worth of services that otherwise would not have been made available. The money collected from towns is used to help offset the cost of supporting a volunteer. Those costs are for travel, insurance, training, recognition and coordination time.

RURAL COMMUNITY TRANSPORTATION, INC.

RCT is a nonprofit organization providing transportation to the elderly, handicapped and disabled through a volunteer service. RCT has been providing service in your community for over twenty years and must reach out again for community support in order to maintain the quality of service that is needed for the members of our community. RCT provided over 194,600 rides per year. RCT transports people to adult-daycare services, senior meal sights and necessary medical treatments such as, dialysis, radiation therapy, chemotherapy, physical therapy, special medical skills and regular appointments. Last fiscal year RCT provided 7 Elmore residents with 271 trips travelling 9,721 miles.

VERMONT CENTER FOR INDEPENDENT LIVING

In FY 2013 VCIL responded to over 2,218 requests from individuals, agencies and community groups for information, referral and assistance and program services for individuals living with a disability. VCIL Peer Advocate Counselors provided one-on-one peer counseling to 310 individuals to help increase their independent living skills and assisted 173 households with financial and/or technical assistance to make their bathrooms and/or entrances accessible. We provide 164 individuals with assistive technology, 40 of these individuals received funding to obtain adaptive equipment. 428 individuals had meals delivered through our Meals on Wheels program for individuals with disabilities under the age of 60.

VERMONT TRAILS AND GREENWAYS COUNCIL

For over a decade, the Vermont Trails and Greenways Council has been your voice for recreation, trails and conservation issues throughout the state. Our membership is comprised of a wide variety of outdoor groups – organizations that work hard, both statewide and at the community level, to provide comprehensive public access to Vermont's recreation resources. Because the Council embraces a broad spectrum of user groups, we are often able to speak with one voice in our efforts to expand and protect public access to trail lands, acquire State and Federal trail dollars and steward natural resources.

Your donation of support will provide a voice for trail interests throughout Vermont. The Vermont Trails and Greenways Council is working to shape the future of recreation in Vermont – for all users. ELMORE TOWN MEETING MARCH 5, 2013

9:00 A.M. Town Meeting was called to order by Jon Gailmor. The Pledge of Allegiance was said. There was a moment of silence for members of the community who have passed away during the last year. Recognition for the dedication of the Town Report to Stuart Weppler was given and a letter from Stuart, who was not present, was read thanking the community for the honor. New residents present introduced themselves. A plaque was presented to Robert Cookson in appreciation for 25 years of service on the Town road crew. Town Meeting Civil Invocation and Robert's Rules were read by Jon Gailmor followed by the warning.

Art. 1 Moderator: Jon Gailmor, nominated, seconded and passed by voice vote.

Art. 2 Town Clerk: Sharon Draper, nominated, voted.

Treasurer: Sharon Draper, nominated, voted.

Selectperson 3 years: Robert Whittaker Hartt, nominated, voted.

Lister 3 year: Susan Southall, nominated, voted.

Auditor: Carla Blood, current auditor not able to continue, Mary Lou Ward was

nominated. She introduced herself and was so voted.

Delinquent Tax Collector: Michel Weppler, nominated, voted.

Constable: Michel Weppler, nominated, voted. Grand Juror: J.B. McKinley, nominated, voted. Town Agent: Michel Lacasse, nominated, voted.

Trustee of Public Funds: Sharon Draper, nominated, voted. **Cemetery Commission:** Kathy Miller, nominated, voted.

School Director: Penny Jones nominated, voted. **LRSWMD**: Jane Oliphant nominated, voted.

- **Art. 3** Motion was made and seconded to accept the Town Report and Report of the School District Officers. Passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 4** Motion was made and seconded to pay a salary of \$3,500 per year to the Town Clerk/Treasurer, and \$800 per year to each of the three Select Board members. Passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 5** Motion was made and seconded to pay a salary of \$500 per year to each of the School Directors. Passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 6** Motion was made and seconded to appropriate \$27,500.00 to support the Elmore Volunteer Fire Dept./Fast Squad. Article passed by voice vote.

- **Art. 7** Motion was made and seconded to accept the list of appropriations as written. Eugene Dambach motioned to withhold \$500 designated to the Lamoille Community Connection until a clean public audit is conducted. It was agreed that the funds will be issued after the 2014 Town Meeting if there has been an audit and the Town is satisfied with the outcome. The Lake Association does not have the need for funds this year but may in future years. Todd Shove with the Special Investigation Unit explained that they are a non-profit organization that helps out the State Police in investigating sex crimes that they don't have the time for. In 2011-12 there were 133 cases that were investigated. Article passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 8** A motion was made and seconded to approve a budget of \$1,901,950 to meet the expenses and liabilities of the Town School District for the Fiscal Year 2013-2014. Susan Southall questioned why the article read to "Authorize the Select Board to set a tax rate" when in fact the State sets the education tax rate. The school board was not sure and said that they would look into it. Passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 9** A motion was made and seconded to authorize the School Directors to borrow money to pay current expenses and debts of the Town School District, in anticipation of the collection of taxes and returns from the State for such purposes and to issue notes to the School District. Eugene Dambach praised the Elmore School for the quality of education that the students received there and pointed out that the Elmore School is the last remaining one room school in the State. Article passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 10** Motion was made and seconded to authorize the Elmore School Board to establish a reserve fund for the purpose of defraying future educational expenses utilizing all carry forward exceeding the amount of \$138,000 budgeted in the revenue projection for carry forward in the 2013-14 school year budget.
- **Art. 11** A motion was made and seconded to vote a budget of \$711,226.86, to meet the expenses and liabilities of the Town for the Fiscal Year 2013-2014, and to authorize the Select Board to set a tax rate sufficient to provide the same. Article passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 12** A motion was made and seconded to raise money equal to those expenditures approved in Art. #8 and #11 on its Grand List for the fiscal year 2013-2014 to pay debts and current expenditures of the Town to be paid to the Town Treasurer in equal installments on September 18, 2013 and March 18, 2014. Passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 13** Motion was made and seconded to apply any surplus from the current fiscal year to reduce taxes in the next fiscal year 2013-2014. Passed by voice vote.
- **Art. 14** Motion was made and seconded to allow the use of vote tabulators for Australian Ballot elections. After some questions and discussion the article was passed by voice vote.

Art. 15 A motion was made and seconded to accept the article with the amendment to read **the First Tuesday in March** and call the 2014 Annual Meeting of the Town of Elmore on the first Tuesday of March, 2014 at 9:00 a.m. Passed by voice vote.

Art. 16 Other Business: There was a reminder for people to fill out the Doyle survey. Olive Ylin pointed out a mistake in the Town Report in the spelling of her daughter's name in the marriage announcement. The correct spelling of her daughter's name is Gaia and not Baia. J.B. McKinley announced that the renovations of the library are complete and for people to please come and visit. General dissatisfaction was expressed with Rt12 repair delays and State wide highway infrastructure conditions. It was suggested that Bob Burley volunteer to testify at the State House on the proposed gas tax bill and highway funding process. There was a compliment given on the quality of the Town Report and the lovely pictures which were taken by Kent Shaw and Jay Kennedy. Kent Shaw, Town webmaster, was also thanked for the good job he is doing on the Town Web site which people should make a point of visiting at www.vtelmore.org.
